- David Fehy: Oppose project as planned at this time. Should wait until after improvements to I-80 overcrossing on Richards.
- Rodney Robinson: Only 6 acres dedicated to research and development, total surface parking 13+ acres. Almost 1/3 of parcel taken up with parking along with roadway surfaces. Would like to see on-site sewage treatment. CUP should be minimum for occupation of buildings.

R. Swanson: Continue innovation park subcommittee (Davis/Swanson) to discuss Nishi?

Community Development Director Mike Webb: Suggest Council subcommittee of Davis/Swanson continue to discuss tax sharing agreements and other common issues for all projects. Staff will draft scope and return to Council.

Downtown Parking Management Plan: Phase 1 Status Update Transportation Planner Brian Abbanat: Provided overview of phase 1 implementation of Downtown Parking Management Plan.

Budget Manager Kelly Fletcher: Ongoing costs of project are processing citations, annual hardware and service maintenance agreements, built in future replacement costs.

Public Comments:

- Stewart Savage, Davis Downtown: Parking downtown continues to be a problem for businesses. Proposed improvements include more aggressive timeline for restricting deliveries and elimination of on-street green waste. Suggest expanding x-permit eligible parking for employees.
- Doby Fleeman: Need to ensure accessible supply of free parking. Consider in-lieu fee concept and/or short term inter-fund loan to purchase necessary parking enforcement equipment.
- Matt Williams: Should consider increasing fines above regional average and testing out high tech parking meters.
- Alan Hirsch: Unitrans should be included in traffic demand conversation.

Lee, to direct staff to return to Council with a plan for a pilot project to test paid parking on a limited one block segment, to include a provision that revenue will be utilized to address downtown parking.
