4. Public Comment

- Natalie Wormeli– ACLU working on incremental change. Recommending care approach to public safety Divest from PD and Invest in community. Commission could recommend complete freeze of hiring in police department.
- Lupita Torres Divest from militarized notion of law enforcement and investing in community. Cultural sensitivity training and mental health awareness training is needed. Needs trust in police.
- Connor Gorman Supports Divesting and Investing.
- Ethan ask commission to look into Council item of parking overnight and consider not criminalizing
- Morgan Poindexter Group of researchers willing to help, collaborate and continue work with research and providing feedback.

6. Regular Items

A. Surveillance Technology Annual Review

The City Council asked the Commission to review and provide comment to the Police Chief on the annual review of surveillance technology used by the Police Department. The Commission received eleven different annual reports on pieces of equipment to review and provide feedback on. Council has reviewed these items twice prior. This is the third annual report to go before council.

Chief Pytel provided background and information on the individual surveillance reports and responded to questions from commissioners.

Concerns/Questions/Suggestions included:

- Request to Auditor and Chief for additional information to be included in reports
- Request for cover sheet on reports that provides annual data
- Request for more user friendly documentation
- Request for documentation on number of malfunctions that body worn and car cameras have
- How many people are using Caretrack, how many staff trained in technology
- Request for total cost of all technology used throughout the year
- Would like information on other agency's technology
- What happens in regards to technology (and City policies) when providing mutual aid (either for other agencies or other agencies assisting here)

• Public Comment

- Connor Gorman —Presentations on surveillance items should come from someone other than DPD. When other agencies come to Davis, what type of restrictions are put into place on stating what technology they use.
- Lupita Torres –. Recommends stopping all facial recognition technology until it can be proven to be accurate.

B. Discussion of Next Steps Related to Defining Community Health and Public Safety Improvements

At the July 6, 2020 Commission meeting, the Commission appointed a subcommittee (Escamilla-Greenwald, Horton, MacBrine, Sherman) to gather additional information regarding the City Council's June 16 directive on community health and public safety. The Commission received an update on Social Services and Human Relations commission steps and provided the subcommittee feedback for moving forward.

Feedback included:

- Additional data requested from presentation that was provided to the Social Services Commission to include:
 - How many arrests for drug and alcohol related calls were in response to service calls vs. officer observation
 - o Clarify what report means when referencing charges
 - o Request for information on officer time spent on mental health calls
- Including people from NAMi to attend. Important to hear from people who use services.
- Understanding of current response for calls for mental health. Way to make it easier for people to find contact information for mental health services, so that 911 isn't first call
- Information on traffic stops, substance abuse responses, calls regarding homeless issues
- Find ways to improve community watch groups to address bias and create a more welcoming community

Public Comment:

- Connor Gorman Separate public safety department, from police with its own hierarchy. Move mental health, homelessness and substance abuse outreach. Also pull out traffic stops from department or out of armed officers.
- Ethan Doesn't feel like any part of the police department is justified. Need to justify why leaving anything in the police department.
- Morgan Poindexter Offers up support and offer to help, whether it be to help understand data in report, etc. Supports idea of safety department.
- Lupita Torres Need for LE to have training in mental health and crisis intervention. And being able to identify when their own members need to seek mental health services for themselves. Cultural sensitivity training. All could work on improving relationships with police.
