

MINUTES OF THE DAVIS CITY COUNCIL  
Meeting of June 17, 2025

The City Council of the City of Davis met in regular meeting session beginning at 6:40 p.m. in the Community Chambers, 23 Russell Boulevard, Davis, California. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Bapu Vaitla.

Approval of Agenda J. Chapman moved, seconded by L. Deos, to approve the agenda.

D. Neville moved substitute motion, seconded by J. Chapman, to amend the agenda to remove consent calendar item Consideration of Letter Opposing Proposed Streamlining of the Delta Conveyance Project. Motion passed unanimously.

City Manager Announcements Interim City Manager Kelly Stachowicz: June 16—Summer camps started on Monday. June 19—City offices closed in observance of Juneteenth holiday. June 20-22—Davis Music Fest, downtown locations will feature musical artists. July 4—City celebration in Community Park. July 31—Low Income Tax Refund Program deadline for qualified homeowners to receive a refund of their Park Maintenance Tax and Open Space Protection Tax.

- Ron Glick: Regular calendar item Budget Adoption—Thank Council for including money in budget to fix 14<sup>th</sup> Street. Regular calendar item Surveillance Technology—support installation of cameras downtown.
- Norbie Kumagai: Los Angeles riots and demonstrations and National Guard presence; large impact to small businesses and restaurants that depend on tourism.
- Alan Hirsch: Long range calendar—August 19 Urban forest discussion, oppose idea of privatizing ownership and maintenance of urban forest to save money.

- Catherine Dwyer: Regular item Budget Adoption—Oppose \$350,000 removed from Veterans Memorial Theater. Regular item Surveillance Technology—Oppose use of license plate readers.
- Alan Miller: City should investigate incident that occurred at Varsity Theater as a hate incident. May 2 incident on UCD campus when protestors expressed antisemitic language. J. Chapman moved, seconded by D. Neville, to approve the consent calendar as listed above. Motion passed unanimously.

Council Subcommittee on Commissions—Neville & Partida: Subcommittee conducted interviews and recommends members be appointed to the following commissions: Climate and Environmental Justice, Fiscal, Human Relations, Open Space and Habitat, Planning, Police Accountability, Recreation and Park, Senior Citizen, Social Services, and Transportation. Subcommittee also recommends modifications to commission structures as follows:

- a. Fiscal Commission membership: Reduce to 5 regular and 1 alternate (currently 7 regular and 1 alternate), intended to be ongoing.
- b. Police Accountability Commission and Senior Citizen Commission membership: Reduce to 5 regular and 1 alternate (currently 7 regular and 1 alternate), intended to be temporary while additional recruitment efforts are underway. The change will reduce the quorum needed to hold meetings to 3 members to ensure regular business continuity. Once future appointments are made, the standard commission membership and quorum requirements will be reinstated.

Public comments:

- Elaine Roberts-Musser: Support citizen participation in local government.
- Patrick Huber: Open Space and Habitat Commission applicant, seeking reappointment.
- Eric Thronson: Transportation Commission applicant.
- Patrick Curzon: Social Services Commission applicant.
- Dillan Horton: Current Police Accountability Commission member. Social Services Commission applicant.
- Leah Hibel: Human Relations Commission (HRC) is undermining Jewish values. Three largest Jewish organizations in the region have denounced HRC MAPA report. Antisemitism is an urgent problem. Council should acknowledge harm that has been done and take actions to cure.
- Alan Miller: HRC is supposed to take reports of hate incidents and should address antisemitism, but Jews feel commission is hostile. Structure of HRC is political and biased.
- Robert Holland and unnamed individuals: HRC members need to fulfill the commission's mission. Council should only appoint unbiased and neutral members. Consider disbanding and revamping HRC.
- Leslie Ang: Fiscal Commission member. Regarding proposed reduction of members—suggest Council not make it permanent.
- Erica: Oppose attacks on commissioners and councilmembers. Small group has chosen put pressure on the city with an agenda that has to do with Israel. One-third to one-half of Jews do not support Israel. Attacks are politically motivated.
- Scott Steward: HRC listens to all sides. Meetings are difficult but necessary.

- John Altagrovn: Antisemitism is rampant. HRC should be about unity and love and respect. Term anti-Zionists is hateful rhetoric.
- Roy Caplan, Hillel Board: Oppose HRC MAPA report, contains tropes and messaging that has upset Jewish community. Unscientific and biased. One of the authors is a commissioner who is up for reappointment.
- Ron Glick: Hope Council figures out a way to improve the situation with HRC and increased antisemitism.
- Miri: Structure of HRC is divisive.
- Amir Kol: Council should consider dissolving HRC. HRC is meant to bring people together and encourage dialogue, make things better. Currently, HRC has taken sides and is not serving as a place of mediation. Should restructure and put guardrails around function.
- Alan Hirsch: Need to be careful when fear is used as a political tool. If people are accused of antisemitism, shouldn't be surprised if they fight back.
- Unnamed individual: HRC should not be disbanded, important space for community.
- Deema Tamimi: Request Council not to base a decision on complaints regarding MAPA report. Report has not come before Council yet. MAPA represents the voice of many people that have been silenced. HRC has an antimerism committee and has called for an antisemitism report.
- Dan Ovejda: HRC does not have credibility and is biased. Council should table appointments to HRC until they discuss the structure and purpose. Need more oversight.
- Connor Gorman: Understand reduction of membership temporarily while recruitment occurs for Police Accountability Commission and Senior Citizen Commission. Regarding Fiscal Commission, don't support permanent reduction of membership.
- Naomi: Should dismantle HRC. Recent actions surrounding MAPA report have done harm, become divisive. HRC has singled out and marginalized Jewish community.
- Vestna Ramile: HRC has fueled hostility. Should be dissolved until a mechanism is put in place to oversee it properly. At a minimum, should not reappoint members that have been complicit.
- Unnamed individual: Should disband HRC and not appoint new members. Divisive body.

D. Neville moved, seconded by L. Deos, to temporarily reduce the Fiscal Commission, Police Accountability Commission, and Senior Citizen Commission membership to 5 regular members with understanding that recruitment will commence with the intent to go back to a full complement of 7 regular members. Motion passed unanimously.

City Council recessed at 8:04 p.m. and reconvened at 8:18 p.m.

Fiscal Year 2025/26 and 2026/27 Budget Adoption (City Council & Redevelopment Successor Agency)

Finance Director Elena Adair: Citywide Budget Revenues: \$245,493,097; Expenditures: \$227,302,113 (excludes transfers). General Fund reserve 11.5%. Staff and Council will be working during the next 12 months to address structural deficit and be within General Fund reserve goal of 15%. Capital Improvement Projects \$38.2 million in new 2-year funding, 67% of funding for streets and roads.

Appropriations Limit FY2025/26: \$130,064,805; 61.91% of appropriation limit used.

Fiscal Year 2025/26 Appropriations Limit

Public comments:

- Karen Galbraith: Need accountability for Measure Q funds, should be used for road and park maintenance. Overgrowth of foxtails since city stopped spraying Roundup. Animals die from foxtails. Council should address the situation.
- Christopher Monty, Brandon Price, Robert Holland, and Sue Allen: Ask Council to restore original budget allocation of \$350,000 for Veterans Memorial Theatre repair and maintenance.
- Elaine Roberts-Musser: Budget does not include enough funding for General Fund reserve and pavement maintenance. Council should not fund increases to staff salaries and cut other costs and redirect funds to pavement.
- Dan Carson: Need to scale back staff pay increases and reduce number of General Fund positions by 10%. Brett Lee: Opportunities to save going forward and to look for additional revenue sources. Thank Council for support of Natalie Corona splash pad project. Support downtown based police officer.
- Lois Wolk, Natalie Corona Committee: Project received a Prop 68 grant of \$2.7 million. Committee raised \$560,000 for project. Thank Council for authorizing a repair and replacement fund. Thank Council for support of Tree Davis activities.
- Alan Miller: Support paving roads and bike paths, downtown police officer, and arts.
- Connor Gorman: City should directly employ individuals rather than use contract services. All workers should receive proper pay and benefits that account for high cost of living in Davis. Maintaining roads and bike paths is part of public safety, should redirect funding from police.

D. Neville moved, seconded by L. Deos, as follows:

1. Approve Resolution No. 25-109 - Adopting the City of Davis Operating and Capital Budget for FY 2025/26 and 2026/27
2. Approve RDA Resolution No. 1281 - Adopting the Davis Redevelopment Successor Agency Budget for FY 2025/26 and 2026/27

3. Approve Resolution No. 25-110 - Establishing Appropriations Limit for FY 2025/26

Motion passed unanimously.

D. Neville moved, seconded by L. Deos, to direct staff to return to Council with plan for achieving greater fiscal stability to include revenue proposals or budget reductions of approximately \$3 million in conjunction with mid-year update.

3. Adopt findings pursuant to Government Code §§ 7070 et seq. and introduce Ordinance Re-Adopting a "Military Equipment" Use Policy and Re-Approving the Use, Acquisition, and Seeking of Funding for "Military Equipment"

Assistant City Manager Stan Gryczko: Summarized project to replace non-LED lighting at two locations.

- Connor Gorman: Support. Fiscally beneficial and helps city meet climate action goals. Oppose PG&E business model, should move in the direction of municipalizing production of gas and electricity.

K. Stachowicz: Council has 2 closed sessions upcoming on June 24 and 30. Last regular meeting before summer recess is July 1.
